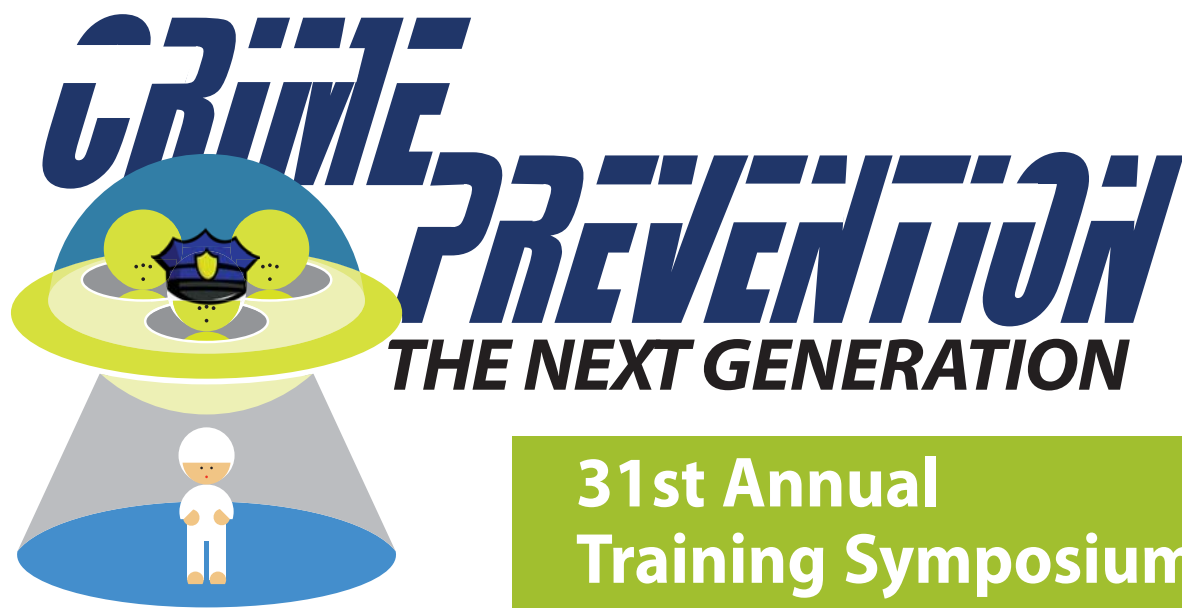

#### Gordon Cruse, Author of "Juvie: Inside Canada's Youth Jail"

As a corrections officer, Gordon realized that the youths he supervised were more than juvenile offenders; they were unique individuals with their own circumstances. He used a simple technique of listening to the youth to connect and build relationships with them.

She was appointed Ombudsman for the Province of British Columbia on May 15, 2006 for a six year term.

#### The complex challenges of investigating Internet child exploitation

Paul left the police force to focus on providing law enforcement around the globe with tools to identify and rescue victims of Internet child sexual exploitation (CSE), in addition to building a cross-disciplinary team of experts and a cache of funds to fight Internet CSE worldwide. After a direct appeal to Microsoft's Bill Gates, the company responded by providing technical support for CETS – the Child Exploitation Tracking System.

#### Mayor Dianne Watts

Surrey Mayor Dianne Watts has led the effort to develop Surrey's new *Crime Reduction Strategy*, an innovative approach to dealing with crime, based on best practices and successful strategies used in other cities and countries to reduce crime and make streets safer. Under her leadership, Surrey became the first city in BC to establish a *Homelessness and Housing Foundation* to tackle homelessness head-on. Funded with \$9.7 million, the *Homelessness and Housing Foundation* is aggressively seeking new approaches to solving challenges related to homelessness by working with senior levels of government and community partners.

**Community Justice Forum Facilitator Training***(In partnership with RCMP 'E' Division – Crime Prevention & Program Support Services)***SHARON BLAKER ~ RCMP 'E' DIVISION RESTORATIVE JUSTICE TRAINER**

Community Justice Forums (CJF) are a well-established restorative justice practice in BC which handles appropriate criminal and non-criminal matters from the court system, the RCMP and other referral agencies such as schools, government and community agencies, and businesses. Referrals are accepted from these agencies to explore the options of resolving the conflict and crime issues at a community level, focusing on repairing harm and relationships through accountability and recognition of victim and community needs.

This three-day course will cover the history, philosophy and theory behind restorative justice and the CJF model. Participants will learn how to assist their communities in addressing harmful and/or criminal behaviour by bringing together the parties affected by the incident, including support for those who caused the harm and those harmed. A key component of the training will focus on the emotional impact that is the result of the offending behaviour on all of those affected. An introduction to basic facilitation skills will provide participants with direction on the preparatory steps required to facilitate a CJF.

This training is open to anyone with an interest in restorative justice as well as those interested in becoming facilitators in communities which currently offer Community Justice Forums or are planning to initiate similar programs. It is one component of the CJF Facilitator's certification. In order to receive full credit for the course, participants must commit to the full three days of training. To receive full certification, candidates must successfully facilitate five Community Justice Forums within a recognized program. There is no cost for this training.

**1 Affordable Housing Options**

DOREEN AQUINO: BC HOUSING

Doreen Aquino of BC Housing will cover subsidized housing and the SAFER program. Seniors can apply to live in subsidized housing in public, non-profit or cooperative housing.

**2 Financial Abuse of Seniors**

JOAN BRAUN: EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE BC CENTRE FOR ELDER ADVOCACY AND SUPPORT

Financial abuse against seniors is often by family members. It can range from "borrowing" a credit card, extorting cash to even conning a senior out of his or her home.

**3 Senior Abuse: A multicultural perspective**

Isolation, 'invisibility', inadequate income, lack of affordable housing and residential care facilities, the high cost of medical and dental care, and vulnerability to abuse and neglect; these are just some of the serious challenges that seniors face. Immigrant seniors are particularly at risk as they struggle with lack of English language skills, sponsorship problems, dependency on their children, loss of their role in the family and difficulties in integrating in their new surroundings. This workshop provides an opportunity to discuss issues affecting immigrant seniors from the multicultural perspective.

It explains the best of current research and community policing practices in recognizing and dealing with abuse and neglect among older immigrants. The signs of abuse and neglect may be different and so can the best ways of offering assistance. People's fears can create significant barriers to seeking help. This workshop will help to counter common stereotypes that public and service providers often have and clarifies what it means for first responders to be "culturally competent".

**10 Specialized Elder Abuse Units: Working to enhance communications and coordination of professionals in our community; better serving clients**ANDREA WRIGHT: FAMILY SERVICES OF GREATER VANCOUVER  
DET. CST. TERRY WILSON: NEW WESTMINSTER POLICE SERVICE

British Columbia is home to several specialized Domestic Violence Units and more recently, Elder Abuse Units. These units use a model of a police partner teamed with a community counsellor/victim support worker. In this workshop the presenters will illustrate how this model works in New Westminster, with a special focus on the barriers involved when working with these populations. Strategies and the building of community partnerships used by the teams will be illustrated through the presentation of in-depth case studies.

Most of the existing programs and services for abused women are developed around the needs and issues of younger abused women and they may not be appropriate for women 50 and older. Conversely, elder abuse services often fail to understand the special needs of older abused women, often victims of long-term violence and abuse. Emergency housing, support groups, outreach services and training of service providers require special attention in order to address the needs of older abused women. As with younger women, their needs will often vary because of race, poverty, ethnicity, gender orientation, disability, homelessness and possible mental health issues.

INSPECTION. KEITH ROBINSON: A/OIC UPPER FRASER VALLEY

This session will orient police and other emergency responders to the key elements of Part 3 of the Adult Guardianship Act – Support and Assistance for Abused and Neglected Adults – and the police role within it, as outlined in the RCMP policy manual. It will highlight provincial policy outlining the importance of identifying "key contacts" whose role is to liaise with their designated agency to ensure collaboration and intervention in complex situations of abuse/neglect of seniors and other vulnerable adults. The workshop will outline an example developed at the local detachment level in Surrey.

**17 Aboriginal Youth Council: Working together to identify challenges and increase safety in urban aboriginal youth population**LORI BECKSTEAD & REBECCA JULES:  
ABORIGINAL YOUTH COUNCIL – VPD WORKING GROUP

Members of the Aboriginal Youth Council will talk about social and crime issues and how they work to resolve them by creating programs and strategies. It will include the Creating Aboriginal Role Models (CHARM) program, a collaborative project that works with Aboriginal youth between the ages of 12 and 23 who are at risk of joining gangs. Project activities focus on reconnecting youth with their culture, engaging them in a series of learning sessions that address the risk factors associated with gang involvement and providing skills development training. Sport and recreation activities as well as mentorship are also offered.

**18 Forensics: Managing multiple deaths**

By contacting Bill Gates of Microsoft, Paul obtained that company's collaborative assistance in creating CETS, (Child Exploitation Tracking System) now being used by police agencies across Canada and internationally.

You arrive at the scene, responding to a 911 call about a frail, elderly woman who had a fall. Her son, a dishevelled, nervous, middle-aged man who smells of alcohol and smoke points you to the bathroom and then disappears to (con't)

the basement. You look around the darkened house and note the mess, the smell of urine, and the layers of dust. You recommend that the woman accompany you to the hospital to get checked out but she refuses to go. What do you do? Learn about the options available under the Adult Guardianship Act in protecting vulnerable adults from abuse and neglect. Explore screening tools used to determine when an adult may meet the criteria for protection by a designated agency.

## 23 The Learning Journey

CHRISTINE MARSH & BONNIE VICKERS: SCHOOL DISTRICT 20

A unique program that is used to teach kindergarten children the difference between normal childhood conflict and bullying behaviours. Aboriginal animals and drawings illustrate a series of books, comparing animal life characteristics to human life-solving skills. The stories introduce culture, science, social studies and language skills, all in an effort to reduce bullying.

## 24 Fighting Fraud

This workshop will illustrate the security features on Canadian bank notes and teach participants how to verify bank notes and protect against counterfeit currency.

## 25 The Bait Locker Program: Targeting crime hot spots for theft from lockers in public places

BRIANNE THAUVERTE: PORT COQUITLAM COMMUNITY POLICE STATION

In Coquitlam it became clear that there was a high rate of locker break-ins in local swimming pools and other public areas. Using the bait car principles, they alarmed some lockers and put up signage to inform the public. Thieves now think twice before breaking into lockers. The program has been very successful, cutting theft by over 50 per cent, and is now implemented in other municipalities across BC; a crime prevention success story at the community level.

## 26 Geriatric Mental Health Crisis

BILL MUNN: GERIATRIC MENTAL HEALTH TEAM, NEW WESTMINSTER AND TRI CITIES

An introduction and overview of the primary mental health issues related to crisis intervention with seniors. The workshop will encourage improved understanding and recognition of the presentations of different types of dementia and cognitive impairment, as well as response/intervention strategies. The symptoms of clinical depression and the impact of change and loss will also be covered.

## 27 Project Protect

RACHAEL JOLICOEUR: INTERAC CORPORATION

A "train the trainer" workshop for Project Protect, a debit card fraud prevention program. The workshop will discuss what debit card fraud is, how to recognize it and how to prevent it from happening in your community.

## 28 Vancouver 2010 Integrated Security Unit

The 2010 Winter Olympics will involve one of largest security plans that Canada has ever seen. You will get an update on activities undertaken so far and what to expect as we get closer to the Games.

## 29 The NASKARZ Program

This exciting and innovative community program (Never Again Steal Karz) is gaining international recognition. ICBC is partnering with RayCam Community Centre in Vancouver and Vancouver Community College to change the behaviour of young people who have been involved in joyriding, auto theft and other anti-social activities by using their interest in cars to teach them automotive mechanical skills.

## 30 Pass It On

CATHY TAKAGAKI AND CHRISTINA ANTONICK: SWOVA (SALT SPRING WOMEN AGAINST VIOLENCE)

This program is for high school-aged girls to talk together on issues important to them such as self-image, sex, and bullying. It includes a mentoring program where young women will be partnered with younger girls.

## 31 WrapAround Surrey/PSST

THERESA CAMPBELL: SURREY SCHOOL DISTRICT

Surrey has a comprehensive and collaborative youth support project for students at risk of joining gangs. A Wraparound Surrey team has been formed from school district staff and police officers from the Integrated Gang Task Force and Surrey RCMP. The team can assess each student referred to the program and prepare an individual support plan. The team then works to ensure all elements of the plan, including support from the student's family, school and community, are implemented and maintained.

PSST (Protect Surrey Schools Together) is an interactive website created by students for students and parents, which provides an avenue for youths to anonymously forward information about potential threats to individuals, to their school and to their community, directly to school district officials.

## 32 Community Response Networks: Preventing Abuse

ALISON LEANEY MSW, RSW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BC ASSOCIATION OF COMMUNITY RESPONSE NETWORKS  
JANE OSBORNE: NORTH SHORE COMMUNITY RESPONSE NETWORK COORDINATOR

This session will illustrate the elements of an ideal coordinated community response to adult abuse/neglect through the eyes of the North Shore CRN coordinator. It will outline key initiatives undertaken on the North Shore including identifying one number for the public to call if concerned about a senior who may be abused, and development of local relationships and protocols for responding. The Support the Supporters project is designed to provide key information to people who are caring for seniors both in so-called "mainstream" as well as ethno-cultural communities, educational initiatives and briefings with police and financial institutions as well as linking with a local First Nation.

## 33 Vocational programs to reduce offender recidivism

Corrections Canada is partnering with Camosun and Kwantlen Colleges to offer trades training to prepare offenders in order for them to be job-ready on release and reduce recidivism.

## 34 Safe Schools: Peace-Building in Langley School District

This interactive workshop will explore the implementation of restorative justice values and principles into a public school district. Dan became involved with Restorative Justice out of his own personal tragedy when he came to realize that punitive, institutional responses to harm are inadequate for bringing about healing and accountability, either in the courts or in school settings. Dan's own story is powerful and compelling, and has given him valuable insight into the effectiveness of restorative processes.

## 35 The Recession and Crime: What should we expect?

DR. DARRYL PLECCAS, UNIVERSITY OF THE FRASER VALLEY

As many places in the world continue to feel the hit from the world-wide recession, there are fears that one consequence of this will be rising crime rates and, in particular, rises in property crime. Should we be worried about this? Will things on the crime front get really bad if the recession persists? This session looks at what we know about how crime rates change during a recession and to which issues we need to be particularly attentive.

How are sentences administered? When do people get released? How do they get released? What is 'provincial time' and 'federal time' and what is the difference? What changes are planned by the government? Renee Marshall will help answer these and other questions about sentencing.

**38 Rock Solid (WITS) Program**

BRUCE BALLINGALL: NEW WESTMINSTER POLICE SERVICE  
ROSS WALLACE: WEST SHORE RCMP

The WITS Program (Walk Away, Ignore, Talk it Out, Seek Help) was developed in Victoria in response to an alarming increase in youth violence. Targeted to the kindergarten to grade 3 age group, this program is designed to give younger children the information they need to make safe and positive choices when faced with situations involving threats, violence or aggressive behaviour. Workshop participants will be given all the tools necessary to start a similar program in their communities.

BENJAMIN PERRIN: ASSISTANT PROFESSOR, UBC FACULTY OF LAW

Mr. Perrin is a leading anti-trafficking activist in Canada and founder of The Future Group, an NGO dedicated to combating human trafficking and the child sex trade around the world. He has advocated

for the adoption of a Canadian national action plan and has pushed for stronger enforcement and more effective victim services. Canada is a source, transit, and destination country for men, women, and children trafficked for the purposes of commercial sexual exploitation and forced labour. Canadian women and girls, many of whom are aboriginal, are trafficked internally for commercial sexual exploitation. Canada also is a source country for child sex tourists, who travel abroad to engage in sex acts with minors. Recently, Mr. Perrin was honoured as one of seven "heroes" by U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton for his work on combating human trafficking.
